THE SECRETARY'S OPENING REMARKS

My first job is to thank our President, Carol Baker, who has brought a great vibrancy and energy to the role. A dedicated and long serving Safeguarding lead she is now also responsible for this with Sale Sharks and consults to the RFU on many subjects under that umbrella. Carol has once again organised the County Safeguarding Conference with some very informative and inspirational speakers. This season she has been well supported by her partner, Ian, and we owe them a great gratitude for promoting the County so well.

To Rugby, both our Senior Mens and Womens XVs sadly came unstuck by Yorkshire in the double header. The Womens XV had 2 high scoring wins against Gloucestershire and Warwickshire in the opening game with the men winning their only other game in the North group against Somerset! Here lies the problem with the latest system whereby Counties selecting at which level they play at and not being placed using a promotion / relegation system as in the past. It means "Pot Hunting Counties" are not challenged and the Counties who play at the highest level are not challenged with enough fixtures.

Central funding is woefully inadequate to the point that many Counties as well as Lancashire feel there is a plan to let County Representative Rugby wither on the vine due to lack of funding. This will not happen.

My congratulations and thanks for all who administered, coached and most importantly, played for the County during the season.

Concerns we had about the playing level regulations for the U20s competition last season have been partially addressed and saw us progress well in the competition, finally being knocked out by the narrowest of margins by our neighbours of Cheshire.

Our Royals had their usually run out at Leigh over the Christmas period in their annual fixture against the Anti Assassins, my thanks to all players and coaches for putting this together and to the AAs for providing stout opposition.

Once again financing a County is not easy and with the current model of targeted funding for specific areas of the game it makes it harder to wield a large brush for a diversity of the games needs. However, we have a good financial team who look after the funding we get. The team of Chris Smail, Paul Deakin, Stephen Briers, and Catherine Ryan are thanked for their continued work for the County and ensuring that the limited funds we are given are used wisely.

Our Mini & Junior Committee have had an excellent season, its been a real turnaround with new and energetic volunteers joining to spread the workload. Ian and Christine Spivey, along with their team are thanked and hopefully the forthcoming season will go from strength to strength.

The Club & Community committee is our vital link between ourselves and our clubs. I pass on my thanks to Malcolm Worsley and his team for the worthy job they have done his season.

Rob Briers has had a fantastic season as RFU President that has included the World Cup in France and an upcoming tour with England to Japan and New Zealand helping to boost his air miles. The ever steady presence of Anne-Marie has no doubt provided invaluable support during a very busy season. Rob is the 8th Lancastrian President of the RFU, all of whom have been worthy of the accolade due to great service to the game. There will be more to come.

We also have Dave Clarke, and new to the Council, Paul Deakin, looking after the Counties interests at Twickenham. The many sub committees and groups they are involved with takes up a lot of their time. In 2016, I asked Deaks, an old friend and Management Accountant, to come to a finance meeting at Hoppers just to give us some advice. As he got out of the car he said "I'm not coming out of here as Treasurer!". The rest as they say is history.

The County Schools Union under the Chairmanship of John O'Ryan with Secretarial duties being done by Robbie Jones. A recent report by John Cole highlighted that Schools rugby was in decline and part of the problem was the lack of local staff to drive this. We, it seems, in Lancashire are happily bucking the trend with a rise in playing numbers, but we are still lacking local staff. We should all recall the cull a few seasons back of the Community Rugby Coach role. I feel we are seeing the effects of what I thought was a shortsighted decision. The County has invested in schools clubs links this season with coaching and mentoring and hope to continue the project.

Thanks to Kate Bennetta for her work with the Womens and Girls players and teams in the County. New to the Board and the W & G Lead role this season, she has worked hard to bed in a new coaching team which has provided squads who have benefitted from the chance to be part of representative rugby.

It is still a fact that Club rugby at many levels of league, age and gender is suffering. Focus needs to be given to retaining youth players to move into adult rugby. Many clubs have seen the loss of one or more teams. These teams are the bedrock of our game and in the majority of cases the ones who keep the club open. If the drop off continues we could be looking at the loss of facilities and pitches. Once gone they will be difficult to replace.

Our lower teams within our clubs are wonderfully looked after by the NOWIRUL merit leagues, administered by Fred Swarbrick and John Powell and I thank them for all their hard work and Tommy Hughes our County Representative to their committee.

Once again the Disciplinary committee have been busier than ever, with a worrying rise in under 18s issues both on and off the field. If parents and coaches could please take notice of the fact that every game is NOT a World Cup Final, and they are not Steve Borthwick or Andy Farrell the game would referees easier to find. Thanks to John Greenwood and his team for dispensing justice, especially Brian Stott whose Fridays are fully taken up with judgements. The hangover from the Thursday Disciplinary party the night before.

My personal gratitude's go firstly to Brian Stott the assistant secretary for covering for me when I have been unable to attend meetings and implementing the Board Structure Review. Secondly, our Chairman, Dave Clarke, Treasurer, Paul Deakin and Director of Rugby, Howard Hughes, a triumvirate who have been invaluable to me. To Carol Baker for keeping us all Safe and Gill Burns for so ably looking after our Volunteers. Anne Clarke for her help with minute taking, communications and the website which continues to grow and lastly Anne-Marie Briers, our Membership Secretary, both ladies are invaluable.

To club administrators at all levels, to my County colleagues, players and members, as ever, summer well.

REPRESENTATIVE RUGBY

On the Men's Representative side of things, it was a good season but could have been slightly better given the rub of the green.

New Team Manager Stephen "Baz" Bailey was delighted that his new charges put on a decent show for the large crowd on the day.

The **U20s** season was a marked improvement on last season despite the continuing player eligibility rules. Our very young-looking squad (0ver 65% where U19) finished with a record of 4 games played 3 Won and 1 loss. Sadly, the loss came in the North Group decider against Cheshire. For the record we used 31 players from 12 Clubs and 3 Universities. Top try scorers were Tom Hesketh (Rochdale) in the Backs with 4 Tries and Ben Dickinson (Tyldesley) in the Pack with 3.

To give you an idea of the continued chaos involving the eligibility criteria we had held our trial and selected a squad only for the County Championship Committee to make a tweak to the rules that made several of the selected players unavailable. We could now pick players from Level 3 and 4 Clubs so long as they hadn't played 1st XV rugby. Again, this tweak came back to haunt us as a member of the squad helped out his own Clubs 1st XV out by playing in the 2nd to last game of the season and thus then becoming ineligible.

The **Senior Men's XV** had the strange circumstance of only having to play 2 games for a shot at another Twickenham Final. The lack of interest from other counties in competing in the Bill Beaumont County Championship meant we ended up in a North Group of 3 with our old friends from the Dark Side of the Pennines and that other "Northern" county, Somerset. Fair play to the lads from the Cider County, they came to Fylde and gave a good showing before the Red Rose boys cruised to a victory.

So that setup a winner takes all encounter over at Hull Ionians RUFC against Yorkshire. In a game where things just didn't quite go our way the home side edged us out and ensure they had a visit to Twickenham for the first time in 16 years.

U16's Girls

Nominations and Assessments:

- O Received 99 nominations from 14 different rugby clubs.
- 94 players were assessed at Trafford MV.
- Two squads were selected, consisting of 45 players.

Training and Matches:

- Held five training sessions over four months.
- One internal game was played.
- O Unfortunately, the game against Cheshire was cancelled due to bad weather.
- Organized an away fixture against Northumberland, providing a great experience for all team members.

U18's Girls

Nominations and Assessments:

- O Received 55 nominations from 10 different clubs.
- 45 players were assessed in November at MMU.
- O A squad of 24 was selected.

• Matches Played:

- Played against Yorkshire at TMV at the end of December and emerged victorious.
- Participated in a tri-fixture against Cumbria and Durham at Preston Grasshoppers, showcasing highly competitive county rugby.

Women

Nominations and Assessments:

- O Received 60 nominations from 20 different clubs.
- o 55 players were assessed at Leigh Rugby Club.
- A squad of 32 players was selected.

Competitions and Results:

- Competed in the Gill Burns Championship.
- Played three games:
 - Beat Gloucestershire 39-6.
 - Beat Warwickshire 43-0.
 - Lost to a very strong Yorkshire team 30-19, ending their season's campaign.

Overall, I am very proud to have been involved this year and hope to continue the momentum going into year two. The dedication and hard work of our coaching and management team have been instrumental in our success. The national 10% requirement from RFU; Regulation 21, of the in depth safeguarding audit, is in place and we will have completed 10 of our 65+ clubs so well above again the nation requirement. Another 10 of our clubs will be visited this year to ensure compliance.

The wealth of experience, commitment and expertise of our

officers is outstanding. We are a very lucky Constituent Body to have such a wealth of knowledge enthusiasm and expertise looking after clubs.

For protecting young persons and adults at risk and the safeguarding you have achieved within your own club. May I take this opportunity and use as a reminder here that appointments to voluntary positions especially coaches and managers of Age Grade rugby; are required to now complete and submit the RFU Safeguarding Volunteer Application & Self Declaration Form

Child Abuse Safeguarding and the reporting of incidents continue to make headlines.

Legal and personal responsibility are at the forefront of tackling offences against children and adults at risk.

We must remain vigilant and continue to promote good practice, reporting and maintain observant practices within our cubs.

The new law relating to POSTION of TRUST is now enforceable through law and is an arrestable offence.

'Position of trust' is a legal term that refers to certain roles and settings where an adult has regular and direct contact with children. Examples of positions of trust include:

- teachers
- care workers

- youth justice workers
- social workers
- doctors.

In England, Wales and Northern Ireland changes to the law made in 2022 extend the definition to include:

- faith group leaders
- sports coaches.

It's against the law for someone in a position of trust to engage in sexual activity with a child in their care, even if that child is over the age of consent (16 or over).

A Lancashire safeguarding officers conference was held this season 20th April 2024, it was as in previous years a very successful conference.

As usual the emphasis was on enjoyment and thanks for the CSO's who give so much of their time. (Rugby Safeguarding and issues relating to Protection being important) but not necessarily the direction the conferences take.

We were honoured this year to have as speakers

Andy Reid MBE (motivational speaker),

Star Scheme (Adverse Childhood Experiences)

Greater Manchester Police - Child Sexual Exploitation

SHE Empowering Females – female equivalent of Andy's Man Club

Dr. Ewan Dean speaking on concussion in rugby and ongoing research.

Catherine Jones from TryIt rugby talking about IMAS international Mixed Ability Sport – rugby and

Kate Bennetta Director Lancashire Rugby Board on the developing Women's and Girls teams, network and development of section.

I again wish to thank all the CSO's and officers at our Lancashire clubs who work tirelessly maintaining and continuing to provide robust and effective safeguarding for Young Persons involved within the game. To keeping them safe, allowing them to be heard and acting upon concerns. To those newly appointed CSO's welcome, it's great to have you on board. Welcome to the role, it is an exciting, challenging, so worthwhile but a necessary role.

MANCHESTER & DISTRICT REFEREES SOCIETY

We are pleased to report that the Society has continued to flourish with 135 active referees, slightly improving on the number for last season, recruiting 33 whilst 25 have retired or moved elsewhere.

Our Starting to Whistle Course has again proved successful and developed to become more effective to include listening in to a level 6 referee on a live game with the result that a greater percentage of

participants are joining. Following on from Starting to Whistle a new course has been created, Developing the Referee which will commence in the coming season.

The fear at the start of the season was the DLV with the introduction of the lowering of the tackle height. However, this proved to be unfounded as players did respond and the number of red cards issued were not significantly higher than last season reducing as the season progressed. 83 red cards, down from 116 last season but abuse going in the opposite direction with 33 reported cases, comprising 18 (8) seniors (8); 6 (0) juniors, 4 (3) spectators and 5 (3) coaches

We received requests to make a total of 2,517 appointments through the season (2468 in 2022/23) and of that number 2,233 matches took place i.e. 89% of scheduled matches up from 82% and we were able to achieve a success rate of 97.9%

Success with the Young Match Officials (YMO) has seen 3 new recruits and two progressing to senior matches before reaching 18 and being supported by the development squad. This is a result not only of their dedication but to the support given by the YMO Officer and the schools; Manchester Grammar, Stockport Grammar, Cheadle Hulme and Lancaster Grammar and our thanks go to all of them.

We continue to support our local Universities and ran a S2W course at the Armitage Centre in October 2023 and another one is planned for this October. This is open to anyone, especially students where we recruit 3-4 each year, whilst others referee the university intramural games which at present are men's matches but it is hoped to start women's games next season.

The Regional 1 North Match Official Team comprising of Northumberland, Durham, Cumbria, Liverpool and Manchester Societies has expanded to include appointments to Level 5 with additional responsibility for assessing, training and the development of referees at this level.

There is a squad of thirty-seven referees, coaches, assessors and camera operators. Nine of the referees have been appointed to referee at level 5, the remainder are being developed to move up. One of the Cumbrian referees has been selected to move up to the NLMOT Associates group

At level 6 and below every active referee has been seen at least once during the season which is over four hundred matches, including exchanges. Our approach is to guide to get the best out of our referees and whilst all will not progress to higher levels, we are grateful for their enthusiasm and commitment at all levels. Our coaches and observers have attended training sessions to ensure that referees are being advised using a common criterion. We are a leading Referees' Society with our record of observing and coaching.

Our relationship with clubs continues on a positive note and we are grateful for their support.

DISCIPLINARY REPORT

Introduction

This shows hardly any increase on last season. However, it must be taken into account that as there fewer matches during this season the overall trend is up. The predicted Armageddon following the introduction of the ELV Tackle Law did not happen, dangerous tackling is slightly down on last season.

Areas of Concern

Match Official Abuse

This is proving to be an ongoing problem. Clubs and players are not getting the message that this is unacceptable behaviour. Disciplinary Panels can only "shut the stable door after the horse has bolted". To this end we will be adding additional; sanction for any player sent off for Match Official Abuse.

Only clubs & coaches can stop players verbally abusing referees. They set the standards at training and match days.

Youth Rugby

We have seen this season a growing number of complaints about the behaviour of coaches and parents. This includes verbal abuse of referees, opposition coaches and opposition players. We have also received complaints of parents entering the field of play and making physical contact with opposition player.

This behaviour is unacceptable, and clubs must act as it does not set a good example to young players.

Should any club require assistance in dealing with any disciplinary issues please contact me and we will be able to give a presentation to support your efforts.

COUNTY SCHOOLS UNION

Lancashire CSU AGM - Chairperson's Report 2024

Last year's Chair's report examines the school's game post pandemic, green shoots and progress are being made thanks to the great work from our colleagues and friends across the county which I am extremely pleased to say continue to be very much the case. Numbers of schools joining our competitions and festivals continues to increase year on

year, and our introduction of Girl's festivals in collaboration with Sale Sharks foundation and latterly with our Cheshire Schools friends is raising profile of the game substantially. We have forged great links with these good people and with the club development team under John Foster. They are promoting the girl's game in our region, especially as we are hosting the women's world cup next year. We are meeting and planning with them, our age grade club colleagues and other stakeholders to ensure we maximise the impact of our e□orts to grow this side of the game.

Significant challenges remain to be addressed; there is still no national or local strategy to ensure rugby is introduced or holds onto a place in many school's PE curriculum. We have inconsistent delivery of support to schools via clubs. Where delivery partnerships exist, we as a CSU or CB are lacking an oversight or auditing facility to determine needs or celebrate good practice. Even where there is a strong club/school link there can be poor representation on CSU competitions or festivals. Equally, those schools attending our festivals need support via signposting potential players to clubs. What we have got is a patchwork of delivery, some excellent, many needing support. Sadly, we have too many of our counties clubs who have no school involvement either through complacency or intransigence. As long as this remains the case, we will struggle as a CSU to break away from a perceived elite sport mode and clubs will struggle to maintain teams at age grade.

External pressures, especially from Association football, which continues to enjoy both funding and media attention to the detriment of all other sports and to a lesser extent our friends at the Rugby League who continue to provide an outreach system to schools that reflects the RDO programme used to enjoy.

In conclusion, there are a few thank you messages to give to the people who have done such sterling work yet again for the county in their own quiet ways. I'm indebted to Robbie Jones and the CSU committee who must be the most hardworking in the country!

Our great friends at MADREFS and Liverpool rugby referees continue to support us brilliantly and we are greatly indebted to their hard work and dedication.

Lancashire Age Grade Committee

Firstly, my thanks go to Christine, Phil, Alan, Lisa and Jon for their time and effort they put into organising and running of the age grade competition. This takes more time than you realise.

At the onset of season 2023-2024 we had approx. 140 teams enter between the festivals and challenge areas of the competitions. Once again, this included clubs merging to make the numbers up for a competitive team, and to allow players to continue to play in a competitive structure. Some clubs still had difficulty in retaining playing numbers, so made use of the dispensation process, to keep players at their clubs.

Again, as with most areas of the game there has been the usual spectator/coach behaviour issues. This can only be rectified by clubs and volunteers being proactive in discouraging this bad practice. (Not an easy thing to do walking up to someone and asking them to stem their behaviour). TREDS should be more promoted more within clubs.

The subject of referee's is a constant one. We have asked teams to look for officials that are independent to the team or coaches referee half a game each. We need to look at attracting more referees to the game. There are some very good young referees coming through, they need to be approached especially at the older end of age grade rugby.

As the season draws to a conclusion, we have 4 end of season dates to fulfil. These are 2 under 12's festival days, the plate & bowl final and the cup & vase final.

This season Burnage RUFC asked to be considered as a host for the u12's festival day. The build up to the festival days were to say the least very wet, but Burnage did a great job on the day, it extremely well. All teams thoroughly enjoyed themselves and a great day was had.
